






8 Building a Generation and "Farm Team" of Limited-Government Office Holders

Since 2013 almost 1,100 people who received WLN training have been elected to local non-partisan offices in their communities. While WLN does not recruit, endorse, or oppose any candidates, it does offer training to those who want to take responsibility for governance in their communities.





4 Building WLN's Network of Independent Affiliates

Since its founding, WLN has affiliated twenty-six citizen activist organizations in Oregon, four in Washington, and one in Texas. In the coming year WLN plans to organize throughout the rest of Oregon and establish itself more robustly in additional states. Since 2011, not a single WLN affiliate has asked to end their affiliation.
